There was a different kind of outcome though for the ladies, as the Holston Home girls beat the female staff 24-13.

The afternoon began with Jeremiah singing "The Star-Spangled Banner" and Drinkwine opening in prayer.

The boys came out strong when quarterback Evan connected with receiver Cade for a first down and then Nate ran in the first touchdown of the game.

"There's nothing like a good, old fashioned Turkey Bowl," exclaimed Drinkwine from the microphone.

But that score didn't last as men's quarterback Williams pitched to John Lucas for a short gain. On the next play, Williams hit Nick Cannon for the men's first touchdown. Abel Carrico then trotted to the field in a turkey costume to successfully

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kick the extra point which put the men ahead 7-6.

The entire game was an explosive back and forth offensive matchup. For the men's team, Williams, Lucas, Cannon, Carrico and Matt Decker had strong showings. On the boy's team, Cade, Evan, Brandon, Nate and Matt put on a show for the ages with their athleticism and studied plays. Cade scored two touchdowns on kickoff returns.

Williams enjoyed a stellar performance but threw an interception just before halftime on fourth and three to Brandon, who ran it straight to the house, giving

the boys a two-point lead. But when the second half resumed, Williams redeemed himself with an interception of his own, which led to another men's touchdown.

With seconds to go in the fourth quarter, the boys' team mounted a comeback as Evan found Matt for a big touchdown as Journey's "Don't Stop Believin'" played on the sound system. This charged the boys and led to a successful two-point conversion, chipping at the men's lead. But in the end it was not enough for a boy's victory.

"To celebrate the win, men's team members popped Ibuprofen

and soaked in Epsom salt baths," a news release about the game said.

The girl's game was fierce too. Emily, Sandra and Jessica all played dynamic football. Emily and Jessica each scored once, and Sandra scored twice, including a touchdown from an interception. Shaylee Tell scored the female staff team's only touchdowns, including one from an interception.

Though the competition was serious, there was a spirit of gratefulness amongst the players. At the end of the game, all players gave high fives and smiled for photos.

"We love our kids and cherish the moments to hit the pause button on the challenges of life," said Williams. "We can just be with our kids and enjoy them for the fun, resilient and incredible people they are."
